The Potter County Planning Commission was created on May 29, 1961 and the first Potter County Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO) was adopted January 12, 1971. An updated / revised SALDO was adopted January 12, 2023. The goal was to provide for clearer, more concise language and to promote and sustain the unique and exceptional character of Potter County, Pennsylvania.

The Planning Commission consists of seven members, which are appointed by the County Commissioners. Commission members serve four year terms and are appointed based on their willingness and commitment to participate effectively in fulfilling the responsibilities of the Planning Commission.

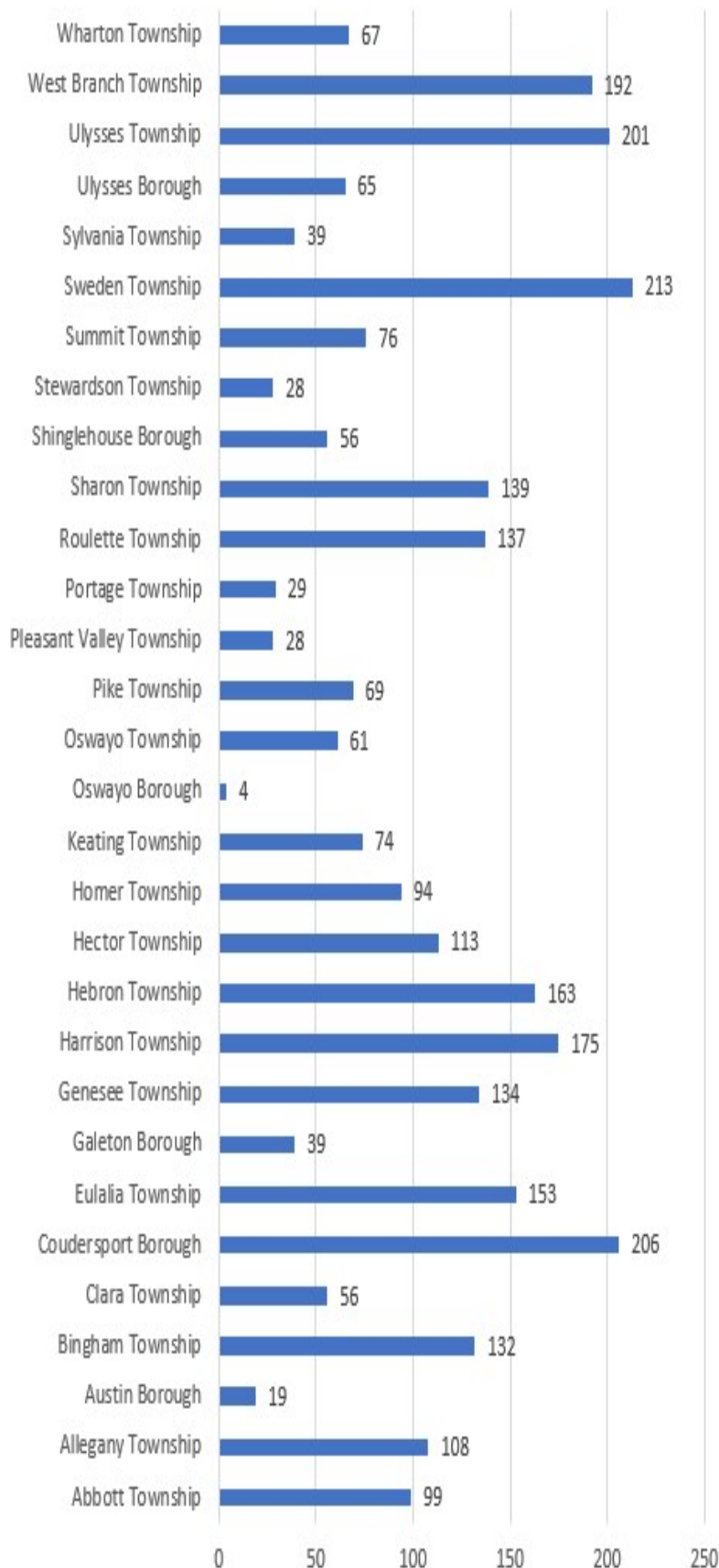

Potter County Historical Totals by Municipality



A historical records scanning project now provides for quick access to information and cross-referencing for nearly 3,000 subdivisions throughout the county. We're able to quickly assist surveyors and land owners who are looking to accurately depict or understand parcel changes over time.

A digital database project created through ArcGIS—using Survey 123 applications—will soon be completed as well. The Planning and GIS Staff have been working together to provide a service that will allow for the County's subdivision application records and survey maps to soon be visible online through the Public Tax Parcel Viewer.

Potter County Planning/GIS Department Activity

2024 PRIORITIES AND GOALS

- 1. County Act 167 Plan Revision**—Work closely with the Conservation District Staff to revise The Stormwater Management Plan, Act 167. Tioga County is currently holding the grant for implementation and we're grateful for this opportunity to partner with them.
- 2. God's Country Village and Farmer's Market**—Work with consultants to improve the site and ensure compliance with DCNR to continue securing the grant funding.
- 3. Site Promotion Program**—Work on reaching the goals by the set dates on the Development and Implementation timeline that was developed by the department to help move along our strategic planning. This is an internal project only, no consultants or third parties are involved.
- 4. Municipal Assistance Program Grant (Map)** — If awarded this Grant it will help to create and develop a Community and Economic Development Implementation Plan to lead us through the back half of the comprehensive plan. When and if awarded we will start working closely on this project starting Summer 2024 which will take the departments full priority over any other projects that come into the department, including the site promotion timeline that is set.

Community Development and CBDG Activity

What is the Community Development Block Grant (CBDG)?

- A federally funded program that allocates funds on a yearly basis to low-to-moderate income communities across the country. Potter County receives roughly \$220,000 per year and it is ultimately under the discretion of the Commissioners to decide which projects are funded based on community need, regulations, and project readiness. These projects must meet at least 1 of the 3 national objectives of Benefit Low/Moderate Income Households (LMI), Urgent and Immediate Need, or Eliminate of Slums or Blight. Majority of the communities in the county are LMI so there is plenty of interest in applying for these funds, so we have multiple projects going on concurrently. These projects are required to have a 3-to-5-year plan from application to completion of the project so within that timeframe the cost of the projects will fluctuate which allow us to move money around to accommodate projects based on the situation and project readiness.

2024 Projects

- The SITES Tool will be an active creation throughout 2024 and we hope to have in production by the Winter of 2024.
- With project income of the allocated funds we have 4 projects concurrently being funded and two of them were under construction in 2023. The first project was the Genesee Water Main Replacement which should be fully completed in spring of 2024 with installation of the flow meters. The other project was the Ulysses Water Infrastructure Improvement which was mainly based around procurement. The beginning of the construction phase started at the end of 2023 and will continue during the spring of 2024.
- Looking into the future, 2024 will have two other awarded projects which are the Galeton Water Phase 2 Overhaul and 2 Austin Borough projects, the Sewer Plant Generator Purchase and Installation and Water Plant SCADA Software Purchase and Installation. Both projects will be under procurement and construction throughout 2024. Austin has another project that has not been awarded but is on the funding radar and is waiting for funds of at least 2 years worth of allocation for restoration of the Sewer Plant Holding tasks.
